## Redistricting Matters – Unit Meeting Topic

The December 21, 2010 release of the census data which determines the number of representatives each state receives marks the beginning of a political process, **redistricting**, which has very important consequences for citizens and is conducted largely under the radar of the citizens. The way that lines are drawn by state legislators for US Congress, Utah Senate and House of Representatives, and state school board districts influences what laws are enacted, policies discussed, and who will be elected in future elections. The same process and considerations apply at the local level.

The census data released in December was used (and is mandated in the Constitution) to determine the number of Congressional seats each state has. Utah received a fourth Congressional seat.

The second set of census data is to be released before March 31. This contains much more information obtained for the purpose of state legislative and local redistricting efforts. This means that the legislature will wait for this data to develop their redistricting plans until after the 2011 session is over. Local governments, such as city councils and local school boards, have until the end of 2012 to finish their redistricting process. Data further refining the populace are scheduled to be released every month until August. You may find a bit of history interesting. In the 1780's Patrick Henry, who opposed the new Constitution, tried to draw Congressional boundaries to keep James Madison, the principal author of the Constitution, from getting a seat in the new Congress.

In Utah six members of the current Legislature were on the 2001 Redistricting Committee: Representatives Jackie Biskupski, Patrice Arent, Wayne Harper, and Senators John Valentine and Michael Waddoups. Senator Waddoups served as chair of the 2001 plan, which has been criticized by the *Wall Street Journal* and others.

The idea of incumbent candidates choosing their voters by drawing their own district lines, rather than voters choosing their candidates, is disturbing to many people. Many feel that "safe", non competitive districts are responsible, at least in part, for the lack of civility in political discourse and declining citizen participation. The Utah LWV has had a position since 1980 advocating a citizen advisory commission to the legislature. Many of our members carried the Advisory Administration Redistricting Commission petition last year and over 49,000 Utah voters agreed that the issue should be put on the ballot. The Utah Citizens Council has adopted the principles in that initiative and, as of press date, is developing a plan calling for a citizen advisory commission and strategies to publicize the issue.

We were standing at an LWV-draped table trying to interest passersby by asking if they'd like free VOTE18 lesson plans provided by LWVUS online. Andrea Blaney, a third grade teacher at Sandy Elementary, stopped to speak with us.

She is already teaching about voting in her class. In fact, a girl in her class wrote to President Obama this fall based on their focus on being involved in what happens in the political life of the country. She wrote him because she thinks she should be able to vote for President and doesn't understand why she cannot. She told him that she listens to speeches and knows who she wants to vote for. However, she complained to Obama, she only gets to vote for school president!!

### **LWVSL Approves Improved Record Keeping of Gifts**

The LWVSL January Board meeting approved a re-designed in-kind donation/reimbursement form. With the form, a process was approved for all members to follow who may be spending their own money. LWVU Development Chair, Stephanie Harpst, says that “donated” or “given in-kind” costs should be tracked along with a dollar value in our records. They can be used to make an application for a grant or large donation stronger in the eyes of those judging applicants. The process is simple:

- Member will submit a copy of the redesigned reimbursement form plus receipts to the Office Manager, keeping a copy for herself.
- The Office Manager will keep one copy of the form & receipts and forward another copy to the appropriate Treasurer, who will write the Member a check if requested.
- The Office Manager will file her copy with the file of the Project on which the money was spent.

## **Affirmative Action At Risk in Utah**

Utah lawmakers may be considering a move again this year to eliminate the state's Affirmative Action programs. To this end, Rep. Curtis Oda, R-Clearfield, attempted to pass legislation in the 2010 session. <http://le.utah.gov/~2010/bills/hbillint/hjr024.htm>. While it did not pass, Oda's bill would have asked citizens whether they should change Utah's Constitution to "prohibit the State, public institutions of higher education, and political subdivisions from discriminating against or granting preferential treatment to any individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, ethnicity, or national origin with respect to public employment, public education, or public contracting."

The effort originated with the American Civil Rights Institute in Sacramento, CA, where co-founder Ward Connerly has launched a nationwide challenge — state-by-state — to the precepts of Affirmative Action. Connerly believes that the need for Affirmative Action has passed, and that states should institute non-discrimination laws without mentioning specific underrepresented classes of people.

The Institute has managed to pass anti-Affirmative Action legislation in five states. Colorado rejected such legislation, and Utah is still on the agenda.

The League of Women Voters, in its Social Policy document from 2009, notes that it has not only supported Affirmative Action, but has filed amicus briefs in several key cases. In an effort to preserve this critical tool for educational, hiring and pay equity, both the national and state Leagues are watching carefully the actions in Utah.
